## Raise the Age Impact

- Detention Data (July 1, 2019 and October 17, 2019):
  - 86 youth detained at DJJ Detention Center at age 17 at the time of admission
  - 131 youth detained (statewide) of youth at age 17 at the time of admission
    - Juvenile Detention Center, SCDJJ
    - Greenville County Detention Center, Greenville County
    - Alvin S. Glenn Detention Center, Richland County
    - Charleston Detention Center, Charleston County

## Secure vs. Community Evaluation

There were 789 Community Evaluation dispositions in FY2018-2019 and (coincidentally) also 789 Secure Evaluation dispositions for the same period.


#### Offense Data

#### Youth Detained for Violent Offenses:

- In FY 18/19, 944 juveniles were admitted to the DJJ Detention Center: 179 (19%) were there with a hold charge that is considered violent.
- In FY 18/19, 1,242 juveniles were admitted to the DJJ's Evaluation Centers: 96 (8%) were there with a direct charge that is considered violent.
- In FY 18/19, 251 juveniles were admitted to the DJJ's Broad River Road Complex (BRRC):
  - 29 (12%) were there with a direct charge that is considered violent.
- In FY 18/19, 479 juveniles were admitted alternative placement: 12 (3%) were there with a direct charge that is considered violent.



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

## Decisions and Dispositions, FY 2018-2019



#### Release Mechanism

Proviso 67.13 - According to Proviso 67.13 of the 2019-2020 Appropriations Bill (full text attached), the Department has the authority to release juveniles from secure facilities or community programs in order to avoid unconstitutional levels of overcrowding when appropriation reductions necessitate that SCDJJ close a facility, program, or housing unit that it operates, or when the Department is unable to fund any additional residential program.

## Proviso 67.14

"67.14. (DJJ: Raise the Age) The department must use carry forward funds to implement Act 268 of 2016 by contracting in the current fiscal year with local child-serving non-profit organizations and Judicial Circuit Solicitor's offices for community-based diversion and intervention services. The department shall give preference to multi-agency and organizational collaborations that include stakeholders from the Family Court, Department of Education, Public Defenders' Offices, the Department of Mental Health, the Department of Social Services, and community based non-profits that utilize best practices."
